Originally known as "Katharakardia" St Serf's Players reformed in the autumn of 1948 to perform three one act plays, The Ugly Duckling, In Waltz Time and John Grumlle. It is an amateur club that originally performed 2 plays a year in the old hall that stood adjacent to the church. In 1959 the new halls were built and because of the strong connection with the drama group, significant effort was put in to design the halls with drama in mind. Even today the stage and other facilities are regarded amongst the best for an amateur club.

The club presented many full-length plays including *Dear Brutus*, *Blithe Spirit* and *The Happiest Days of Your Life* until 1982 when the decision was taken to perform a Christmas show for children. The first of these was *The Wizard* of Oz and was a great success. We have continued to repeat the format every year but building on our experience both from the acting and the staging of the show. It has enabled us to include a wide range of talent across a wide age group and from other community clubs and individuals.

As part of the community, the club used to host The Churches' Drama Federation (CDF). In June 2002 St Serf's Players hosted a one act festival for local clubs, Granton Players, St Serf's Players and Wardie Drama club, which was a great success and indeed the format was repeated in 2004 with Granton Players, Leitheatre and St Serf's Players all taking part. In 2010 we entered the Edinburgh Festival Fringe for our first time with *Treasure Island* that was written by two of our club members.

The club has continued to develop the facilities with the upgrading of the lighting rig and sound equipment to the latest digital standard, installation of a loop system for the hard of hearing and recently investing in new tracking and curtains, with the help of a lottery grant.

St Serf's Players is a member of the Scottish Community Drama Association (SCDA) and in 2010 won 1st place for our production of One Day I Met Myself Coming Home. In 2011 our production of Alas Poor Geoffrey won the Edith Forbes Trophy for 1st place, the Eric Bennett Trophy for the Highest marks for Production and also the Bobby Watt Cup for the Best Stage presentation. Last year we came first and second with A Mystery Tour and Imperfect Strangers but only the former went on to represent Edinburgh at the Divisional Final due to SCDA rules only allowing one team from any club to progress to the next round. We won 2012's inaugural 'BESTof theFEST' audience appreciation award with A Mystery Tour and have once again been awarded that accolade in 2013 with You Really Got Me.

We are always trying to encourage new members and over the last years have had an increase in our membership.

Our next production will be The Steamle in May.

Aberdour Players have been in existence since the summer of 1987, when some residents got together to stage a production of @Mary Stuart@ at Aberdour Castle during the village's annual festival. Since then we have gone on to produce nearly 60 plays (both one-act and full-length) for performance in the village and elsewhere.

Our youth group formed in 2005, now have around 30 members and numerous successful productions under their belt, including several entries in the SCDA Youth festival - indeed, last weekend they competed in the Youth Divisional Final in Dalgety Bay.

The adult section try to stage two productions a year in Aberdour (a full-length play or a selection of one-act plays) and we usually enter at least one play into the SCDA annual one-act play competition. We meet regularly at least once a week throughout the year, not just to rehearse but also to read plays for fun, hold workshops and so on.

Performances in Aberdour take place in a variety of venues, including the village Primary School with its 'prpoer' stage, the village hall, the church hall and even one of the local pubs (where we performed Jim Cartwright's 'Two' a few years ago).

The club's emphasis has always been on enjoyment and drama 'for the community by the community'. We also pride ourselves in the variety of ways we perform - for example this years cast of just two is a change from our 2011 offering at the Divisional final with its cast of 28!. We are delighted to have made it through to the Divisional finals here in Larbert and look forward to renewing acquaintances and making new friends with the other competing clubs.

Performances in the Eastern Divisional Finals over the last decade include 'The Artk' (2004), 'Hello Out There' (2006), 'The Man with the Flower in his Mouth' (2007), 'The Happy Journey' (2009), 'A Kind of Vesuvius' (2010), 'Pullman Car Hiawatha' (2011), and 'Say Something Happened' (2012).

This Year we bring you 'Better Days Better Knights' - a forgotten gem written in the 1970s by a Scottish playwright and philosopher, the late Stanley Eveling. Impossible to define, we hope the audience enjoy its rather oblique take on the neaning of life!

We're looking forward to participating in what looks like another strong and varied Divisional Festivlal here at Dobbie Hall in Larbert.

OUR ADJUDICATOR: COLIN PETER

What led him into adjudicating? A life time of theatre experiences has given Colin the enjoyment of working in all areas of stage craft, and a willingness to appreciate and to learn from fellow performers whether professional or amateur. From dancing on stage at the age of two, being brought up in a theatrical house hold, mixing as a

youngster with the Edinburgh five past eight variety performers, acting and singing, on to designing sets and lighting, and on to directing Colin has a lot to share and

pass on. And like fellow amateurs, that is all on top of his day job.

With now over 50 productions as a director working with many companies he had led casts and backstage teams to strive for their best, and has given audiences memorable productions and thought provoking moments of theatre — The razzmatazz of a youth company's Barnum, the patients camaraderie in One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest, the gas chambers of Nazi Germany in the final moments of Cabaret, treating the SCDA summer school youngsters to a surprise preview of a world premiere musical with 12 Zulus from South Africa, and directing the winning play in the Gaelic Mod (without knowing a word of Gaelic himself).

For this competition he had read each of the plays several times, and looked at the challenges for each team for the director, actors and backstage teams. During each night watching each play being performed, he jots down strengths and weakness that he sees, then during the intervals makes sense of his notes giving marks under SCDA criteria. While the raffle is on he has only a few minutes to gather his thoughts before sharing with you the audience and performers, his personal thoughts, encouragement and constructive criticism on what he saw that night from each club. It is for you to judge whether you agree with comments he offers on each team and his selection of trophy winners on the final night. He hopes that like him over the years you take away an experience to talk about.

MARKING SYSTEM

The adjudicator assesses the performances of a team under the following four headings, awarding marks to the maximum shown. These marks are not made public.

Leitheatre has its roots in Leith where, as Kirkgate Church Dramatic Society, it was established in 1946. After using a succession of premises for rehearsal and storage in Edinburgh we finally found a permanent home at 20 Sunnyside in 1997. We now have two rehearsal areas, a large workshop, a scenery store, a wardrobe and dressing room area, a props room and a technical storeroom. A Green Room, kitchen and toilets complete the facilities in our clubrooms of which we are very proud. Keen supporters of the Scottish Community Drama Association from its inception, our productions of "One Flew over the Cuckoo's Nest", "Willie Rough" and "A View From The Bridge" were recent winners of the Fraser Neal trophy for the best full-length production in Eastern Division. February each year sees us participating in the SCDA One Act Play Festival. Since 2000 six of our entries have reached the Divisional Final and two the Scottish Final. In 2003 one of our members was awarded the Scott Salver for the best new play.

In January each year we present a half-hour touring show depicting the life and works of Robert Burns. Since its formation in 1971, Stirling University Drama group, or SUDS, has been attracting a wonderfully diverse group of people through its doors and can boast Law, English, Finance and Science degrees among our Alumni. With no theatrical program to speak of at the University, those with a passion for all aspects of drama and production strive to inject a bit of culture and humour into the day to day lives of the students.

We put on three main shows each year, with recent examples being The History Boys, One Flew Over The Cuckoo's Nest, The Scottish Play', and our current production of Blood Brothers. On top of that we dabble in our forte twice a yea with a Comedy Festival which contains only material written by members of the society. This show is renowned within the city and draws notoriously big crowds, as well as being award winning within the University itself. In juxtaposition to the festival, we perform a biannual 'Freeplay' which also contains material written by the society, as well as extracts from a wide range of plays and prose, and enables 'Sudsians' to demonstrate their more serious side, with both types of performance encouraging new members.

However SUDS is not just about the acting. The society offers people the chance to direct, produce and get involved in backstage in various capacities.

Finally, and most importantly, for a University society, are all the social activities we get up to en masse. Pub crawls, theatre tripe, meals and just generally socialising allow us all, regardless of age or academic interest, to become friends and that is the most important thing about SUDS.
